English Learners Gain Better Access to Community Services with EL/Civics

One Family Fought to Protect their Teenage Son from Violence...and Won

Eight months after Language, ETC launched its EL/Civics class, the students and teachers say they are seeing very positive results. The combination English language instruction and community outreach class, which is funded by a grant from the State Education Agency, offers recent immigrants instruction on basic English skills and an orientation to a variety of social services, such as day care and public safety. Class activities range from filling out forms to going on field trips. This program is unique because it also provides much-needed childcare for the students' children - a service coordinated by UDC's Department of Gerontology, which also provides training for its senior citizen volunteers.

Recently, two EL/Civics students saw firsthand the benefit of being able to access community resources. Roberto and Ana Bernal of El Salvador say that thanks to the help of their EL/Civics teacher, they were able to find a safer learning environment for their teenage son.

He had been attending a local public school when he was attacked by another student. Neither the school administrators nor the police, they say, were able to help them protect their son.

Together with their teacher, they researched

charter schools in DC and were able to complete their son's transfer within weeks. Ana says that it was a very difficult experience all around.

EL/Civics runs Tuesday and Thursday evenings and is taught by Chenentia Gay and Ruth Takushi.

First Impressions Meant Everything

This past summer, I decided to make a career change, looking for work that I felt was more fulfilling. Just two months later, I was hired as the new Executive Director of Language, ETC.

As I told friends and family of my new job, nearly everyone I talked to shared how they had either volunteered for the program at some point in the past 10 years (including my sister) or had a friend that had been involved in some way. Once I began in September, I saw with my own eyes the incredible impact of the program.

Of the more than 100 volunteer teachers in our ranks, most are returning teachers,

whose commitment has continued semester after semester, over the course of many years. Not only do they dedicate hours of class time each week, they give additional time in preparation, meeting with their group teachers and spending extra hours tutoring individual students. The difference they make is profound. There are 800 students registered this trimester alone. The majority have advanced to the next instruction level since the last term. I was lucky to have inherited a very competent and committed group of colleagues working behind the scenes. Our new ESL Coordinator, Annette Langdon, has

implemented instructional and procedural changes that are already receiving praise from teachers and students alike.

Ruben Elvis Baca runs a bustling, first-rate computer lab and Antonio Vidal, our Admissions Coordinator, is the glue that keeps it all together.

Over the past ten years, LETC has served the adult immigrant population of the

Our Focus is on Teacher Training

Greetings! As one of the several newcomers to Language, ETC, let me take a moment to introduce myself. I have lived in Washington, DC for nearly eight years, coming here from Colorado to study at American University. After

receiving my B.A. in International Studies, I decided to stay and complete my M.A. in Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages, eventually leading me to Language, ETC. My experience as a teacher and volunteer coordinator with various adult ESL organizations prepared me well for the enormous, yet rewarding, job of the ESL Coordinator here.

of our main goals for this year is to increase the amount of training available for volunteer teachers. Already, we've seen more than 115 volunteers attend

volunteers and get a sense of the experience and commitment that keep this organization running strong.

Student Success Story

How Noemi Hernandez Finds Motivation

Level 1 student Consuelo Noemi Hernandez remains highly motivated to learn English. With 18 months of living and learning in the U.S. under her belt, she feels more comfortable using English around the neighborhood, and more importantly, at work. While most of her co-workers at Burger King only speak Spanish, after a short while studying English at Language, ETC, she is now able to speak in English to her boss,

who doesn't speak Spanish.

For 18 year-old Noemi, like many students at LETC, the push to learn English also comes from home. She attends class with her 16 year-old brother, Dimas, and they both will soon complete a fourth semester, advancing to an intermediate level. It is thanks to the sacrifice of her older brother, Noemi says, that she is even in the United States. In early 2001, he had been living and working in the District

when he paid the way for his younger sister and brother to leave El Salvador. Unfortunately, limited time and funds have kept their older brother from attending class as well.

Finally, Noemi notes the dedication of the teachers at LETC. If the weather is bad, it's easy for students to say they'll miss a class, but not the

power of language to advance in life. He often served as a translator for his parents. Their struggle to carve a life for themselves, inspired him to make sure that no one's voice is left unheard.

Too often, Carlos adds, immigrants are treated poorly at work and in their communities simply because they do not have enough vocabulary or proper grammar, and they lack the confidence to speak up for themselves. When Carlos teaches, he puts a lot of faith in his students to communicate in different ways. They lack the tools, he adds, not the ability.

It is that philosophy that prompts Carlos to teach the basic English levels - to both instruct and inspire his students to continue their studies.
